Position Description:

PLS 21 is taught every Fall, Winter, and Spring quarter with 16 lab sections, and runs for 8 weeks as opposed to the usual 10 weeks. TAs must attend the same lab sessions each week (scheduled based on TA availability), and will be responsible for delivering instructions for labs, helping students during labs, grading lab and lecture homework, and holding office hours. We also host a required staff meeting on Thursday nights after lecture.

Preferred background: Preference will be given to students with technical communication skills, and experience working with advanced features of course software (e.g., MS Excel, MS Access, R). Students without these skills will still be considered, but they must be willing to learn the material on their own such that they can confidently teach labs.

TA's responsibilities for a 25% appointment may include (not to exceed 10-12 hours per week on average):

- Helping to grade exams and quizzes

- Assist with class preparation
- Attend weekly staff meeting (Thursday evenings)
